secrets) from the media world. She also promises to answer any questions about current national and international politicians, fake news, or even about her appearances on the Netflix show "House of Cards" or HBO's "Veep."

Presutti is the daughter of Dom and Clara Presutti who spent decades as a teacher and school nurse within the Bellaire School System. Their love of teaching has trickled down to her family. She has two teen daughters and a loving husband - they volunteer annually in a destitute barrio of Nicaragua, teaching English to children. Carolyn and her family live in the Washington, DC area. See below for more information about her career.

Presutti began presenting speeches through the Rock Hill 4-H club. Safety speaking contests were her forte, winning trophies at the Belmont County Fair and "Outstandings of the Day" at the Ohio State Fair. Those performance traits were cemented with various BHS drama roles from Linus (You're a Good Man Charlie Brown) to Chastity (Anything Goes) to Tzeitel (Fiddler on the Roof) to Ado Annie (Oklahoma!) Whenever BHS teachers gave students the option of speaking or writing assignments, Presutti chose speeches. Senior year, she was elected to the school's morning announcement team. Her love of speaking continued at Akron University, where she participated on the forensics (competitive speech) team and majored in Mass Media/Communications with a minor in Ballet Performance.

WHBC-Radio in Canton hired her out of college as a part time anchor/reporter. She fondly remembers "the quaint format" that included reading local obituaries on Sunday mornings and covering local politics on weeknights. From there, she left for WKBN radio in Youngstown where she co-anchored afternoon drive time newscasts. Her goal of television motivated her to take a second job as weekend weather anchor at WTRF-TV in Wheeling. Every Friday night, Presutti would leave her Youngstown job at 7pm and drive to the Ohio Valley, where she would appear as the Channel 7 weathercaster at 6 and 11

Bellaire Middle School receives support

BELLAIRE - Students from Bellaire Middle School are looking forward to an

upcoming trip to the nation's capital, helped in part by generous donations from a group of alumni.

Eighth-grade teacher Eilen Johnson is planning to take a class to Washington, D.C., at the end of March, but the trip is somewhat expensive. Disposa said it costs D.C., at the end of March, but the trip is somewhat expensive. Johnson said it costs \$460 per student; the money helps to pay for food, housing and transportation costs while the students are in the capital city. When eight students ran into fine capital When eight students ran into financial issues that could have prevented them from visiting D.C. with their classmates, the Bellaire High School Class of 1965 stepped in to help.

"I was determined to help send these kids to Washington," said Anita Smigill,

an alumna of the Class of '65

Smigill said that every five years, her graduating class holds a reunion and party where they raise money to give back to the school district. Smigill said even though the class is in between celebrations at the moment, when she heard that some of the children might not be able to go on the trip she quickly moved to help. The \$1,000 the Class of '65 had ready to donate would only have paid for two stu-dents to go, so Smigill reached out to classmates on Facebook in an effort to raise funds for the students. She said her classmates were swift to respond.

Within two days I had started to get donations in the mail," she said. "People were very generous.

The Class of '65 managed to collect \$3,195 to help send all eight of the students to Washington with the rest of the class. In addition, she said American

Legion Post 77 in Neffs donated \$200 to the cause, so that each of the students will have some spending money to get a sou-yenir to help them remember their time in the capital.

"It makes us feel so good," Smigill said of donating to the cause. "I know there are a lot of kids who can't afford to go, so we wanted to make sure those kids had the chance to take a trip for a little education and enjoyment

Johnson said she is incredibly grateful for the generosity of the Class of '65, adding that she was "overjoyed" at the news. Principal Derrick McAfee agreed, saying the former students had given the current ones "the trip of a lifetime."

"We're so flattered and honored having the support of the Class of 1965, McAfee said. "It speaks volumes about this town to have people like that care about these schools and these kids.

on Saturdays and Sundays. At 11:30pm Sunday night, she would drive back to Youngstown to anchor her radio job the following day.

This eventually lead to a main weather anchor job at WFMJ-TV in Youngstown. But in between the 6 and 11 newscasts, Presutti would cover news stories. Her investigative report "Dirty Dumpster Syringes" was shown to the Ohio House of Representatives as it debated a bill on hazardous medical waste. Her documentary on a tornado disaster won her an Emmy nomination.

After several years, her love of news finally pulled her back. WTVR-TV in Richmond, Virginia, stole her away as their Virginia State House Reporter and 11pm live reporter. To this day, Presutti's favorite assignment is live reporting. Eventually Presutti was named weekend anchor/ weekday live reporter. In Richmond, she broke a story on then-governor Doug Wilder who had organized an exploratory committee for a presidential run. She had just completed an investigative story on homosexuality in Catholic seminaries, when an even higher television market would call. Getting closer to her career goal of Washington, DC, she left Richmond for Baltimore. At WMAR-TV, she was known for breaking exclusive stories. Her reporting included prison riots, major company strikes and a convicted murderer who jumped out a courtroom window to escape sentencing.

In 1994, Presutti finally arrived in her careergoal city - Washington, DC-a top ten television market. WUSA hired her as morning anchor/reporter. She worked 11p-7a, chasing stories overnight - typically murders, prostitution, drug-related crimes - and finishing her shift by co-anchoring the 5-7am morning show.

Two years later, she joined Belo Broadcasting as a Washington reporter for its 21 US television stations. Presutti covered President Bill Clinton and the Lewinsky scandal, President George Bush's inauguration, the 1998 US Capitol shooting, the Jonesboro school massacre, and several hurricanes. She also anchored the weekly political talk show, "Capitol Conversation" for which she won a Texas Emmy. It was also during

this time that she met and married her husband, • worker a Wikipedia mention. Rick Davison, who is a United Airlines Pilot.

Presutti stepped out of the business fulltime in 1999 to have her older daughter Theresa and then Natalie in 2001. But she continued to work as a freelancer for several outlets, including CNN, Tribute Broadcasting, WTTG Fox5, and AARP-TV. While at WTTG, she won an Associated Press award for her story on military body armor. While at AARP, she reported on a barnstorming air show and won an Emmy for "The Flying Circus."

In 2010, Presutti joined Voice of America TV as general assignment reporter, with an emphasis on aviation and high tech. VOA is a global multimedia broadcaster, financed by the US government, with its mission signed into law by President Gerald Ford. VOA is charged with presenting different sides of issues on TV, radio, and on the web, especially for areas that typically only have access to state-run biased media. VOA averages more than 237 million viewers/listeners per week and broadcasts in 47 languages.

On the ten-year anniversary of 9/11, Presutti aired an exclusive report identifying the man in the iconic photo, jumping from the World Trade Center. The story won a national Clarion award and an Associated Press Outstanding Enterprise report. Throughout her years at VOA, she's won awards for her stories on the Boston Marathon bombers, a Haitian amputee soccer team, and US Political Campaigns. Her story on US doctors virtually conducting surgeries of gunshot victims in war-torn Syrian won a NY Festival Silver World Medal. Her last year's web multimedia project entitled "American Muslim Portraits" won the highest award "Best of Show" by the Associated Press Broadcaster's Association.

As an anchor of VOA's Learning English segments, Presutti has taught English through slow reading of news stories and has received FB messages and letters from all over the world from viewers who want to learn more.

In 2013, Presutti applied for VOA to receive the beta version of Google Glass and then instructed other reporters on their usage. For one of her stories, the lead singer of the a cappella group "Pentatonix" wore VOA's Google Glass during a live concert, earning Presutti and a co-

In 2015, VOA chose her to attend a ninemonth government management training course "The Executive Leadership Program." In 2016, Presutti was chosen as VOA's delegate to the Aspen Institute's Socrates Program where her focus of study was Artificial Intelligence. This lead to a week at VOA's Silicon Valley bureau last year, covering virtual reality brain surgery (where she reported from inside the operating room,) driverless shuttle buses, mental health apps, robotic clothing sorters, and more.

Television isn't Presutti's only media outlet. You can also see her "House of Cards" playing - what else? A television anchor! She and her daughter Natalie appeared as extras on the HBO show "Veep" and she was an extra in the 2010 movie, "How Do You Know."

Presutti is a visiting professor at the FBI academy in Quantico. There she teaches agents how/what to say in a TV interview and how to avoid questions from reporters (!) But her favorite time instructing is in a destitute area outside of Grenada, Nicaragua, where she and her family have been teaching English annually for the past five years. They have also held special school events and field trips, purchased Bibles for weekend Bible study, and have sponsored several Nicaraguan children in their home. Her older daughter Theresa will spend her gap year volunteering there before college.

Presutti credits her parents for instilling in her a love of learning, a strong sense of empathy and a love of the Lord. And her siblings for enduring her natural curiosity, constantly badgering them with questions while growing up. She thanks her husband and two daughters for all their love and support and for tolerating long work hours and travels that take her away from home. Presutti knows that no matter where work takes you, home is still with God and family.

Presutti is an avid traveler, scuba diver, 5K runner, and she's passionate about Bikram hot yoga. Her goals include speaking fluent Spanish, presenting a Ted Talk, mastering a split like she could do as a BHS cheerleader (oh those old, tight muscles!) and sending her daughters off to college with enough money left for her and Rick to enjoy retirement!

2018 OVAC Hall of Fame Inductees: RON LEE - CLASS OF 1971 GEORGIA DAWSON - CLASS OF 1984



RON was an outstanding running back who graced Nelson Field for the Big Reds. Ron played at the time under the helm of Coach Jake Olsavsky. Ron's senior year record was 8-1-1. Bellaire finished second in the OVAC 3A title chase. The Big Reds finished No. 19 in the UPI Class 3A poll, the largest classification in the state. Ron rushed for 989 yards and 16 TDs. He also caught 10 passes. Ron earned first-team All-Valley with those numbers and All-OVAC plaudits while being namedd second team All-Ohio by UPI. He also played in the Ohio North-South game. Ron was a standout three year letterman in basketball also and voted the Big Reds top athlete his senior year.

His prep honors earned him a football scholarship to WVU which he chose over many D-1 offers. Lee had an outstanding career at WVU. Back in those days freshman were not eligible to play so Ron played on the Mountaineers frosh squad leading the team with 372 yards on 97 carries in five games. Into his sophomore year Ron moved into the team's No. 2 fullback position, carrying the ball 76 times and rushing for 304 yards and three TDs. His toughness, matched by his versatility, resulted him being utilized as fullback and tailback his final two seasons. He was the team's second leading rusher, gaining 543 yards as a junior and 623 yards as a senior and led his team with 10 TDs.

He was a member of two WVU Peach Bowl teams. Selected as No. 74 on the list of top 100 all-time WVU football players in the WVU Athletic Department Book, "Saturday Snapshots," published in 2015. Ron's success at WVU resulted in him being selected in the third round of the NFL. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts. There he played in 42 games, starting eight. His career with the Colts ended with 940 yards on 206 carries.

GEORGIA was a tremendous three sport standout for the Big Reds, where she excelled in volleyball, basketball and track & field. She achieved a rarity in the realm of Bellaire athletics, becoming a four-year letter winner in basketball, surpassing the 1,000 point goal and also grabbing more than 1,000 rebounds. She served as captain for the Big Reds hoopsters her junior and senior year. She was a three-time all OVAC selection while making the All-Valley first team as a senior. Georgia was named a two-time All-District 12 basketball honoree and was a special mention All-Ohio as a senior. She was just as dominate in volleyball for the Big Reds. A three-year letter winner served as the team captain her junior and senior year, receiving first-team all OVAC honors.

Georgia was also a three-year standout for the Big Reds track team. In all, she finished her illustrious prep career with 10 letters. After graduating from BHS Georgia took her athletic talent to West Liberty State College, where she became a four-year letter winner in basketball and volleyball. She was the Hilltoppers' volleyball captain as a junior and senior, making the WVIAC All-Conference Team three seasons while being named Conference Volleyball Athlete of the Year her senior season.

Georgia still ranks in the top 20 in rebounds in Hilltopper history with 541 rebounds. She was inducted into the Bellaire High Hall of Fame and the West Liberty Hall of Fame, honored by the Upper Ohio Valley Dapper Dan in 1988 and inducted into the Ohio District 12 BCA Hall of Fame last year.
